Scranton was incorporated as a borough in 1856 from Providence Township (now extinct) and named for brothers George and Selden Scranton, of Connecticut and New Jersey, who came to the area in 1840 to smelt iron.

In 1866, the City of Scranton was incorporated upon the merging of Scranton Borough with Hyde Park and Providence boroughs and parts of Providence Township. In 1878, Lackawanna County was created from a portion of northern Luzerne County, and Scranton was designated the seat of the new county.

After the Lackawanna County Courthouse was built in 1882 and industry expanded around coal mining to include manufacturing of silk thread, machine-made lace, railroad locomotives, machinery and more, Scranton emerged as a showplace, becoming the banking and commercial center of the valley. Coal, freight, as well as passenger rail lines, dominated the community. Between 1880 and 1920, the city constructed the bulk of its commercial and cultural fabric and installed the first electric streetcar system in the United States.



With a growing population that has learned to unite its old-world values and hard work with innovation in business, health care, educations, arts, culture and beyond, Lackawanna County is truly poised at the forefront of modern America.

Whether in terms of a strong work ethic, neighborly friendliness, or generosity of spirit, the population of this region has proven itself to be just as diverse as the industries, activities, and other amenities located here.

Not only do we offer an award-winning workforce, a booming business climate, and a superior quality of life, we also offer recreational and cultural activities for all ages, from a thriving arts scene to historic sites and show-stopping performances.

Lackawanna County's medical infrastructure is strong. Three hospitals are located within the county and within walking distance of downtown Scranton. Altogether, there are 16 hospitals and more than 1,000 patient-treating physicians in Northeastern Pennsylvania that can handle all but the most esoteric medical treatments such as transplantation, including neonatal intensive care, specialized geriatric care, cardiovascular care, an accredited regional trauma center, home health care organizations and more.

Transportation

Positioned at the crossroads of 5 interstate highways, Lackawanna County is an overnight truck delivery to 96 million North American customers, making it the perfect location for businesses looking to expand nationwide. We're less than 2.5 hours and 130 miles from Harrisburg, Philadelphia, and New York City; 240 miles from Washington D.C. and less than 300 miles from Pittsburgh.

With a local airport, both public and private bus systems, as well as rail transportation, residents have mobility and businesses have the infrastructure to manage various shipping means.





Business and Economic Development

Poised as a hub of innovative business activity, northeast Pennsylvania offers an award-winning workforce, low operating costs, and a booming business climate. With access to millions of customers within a short distance, this region reaches markets that businesses located elsewhere would not reach.

The county's gross domestic product is \$7.7 million (St. Louis Fed, 2019). It is also home to 27 business parks, with inventory of tax-free real estate that can accommodate more than one million square feet. There are also a variety of tax abatement, tax credit, grant, and low-interest loan programs available.

The greater Scranton area offers one of the most affordable housing markets on the East Coast. Housing is priced 30% less than homes in Philadelphia or Hartford and 50% less than Boston or Long Island. While downtown Scranton is amidst a revitalization with historic buildings being transformed to trendy lofts.

The cost of living in the region also compares favorably with other small to mid-size cities in the northeast and is significantly lower than major metropolitan areas. For example, a person making \$50,000 in Scranton would need to earn more than \$68,649 in Philadelphia and more than \$129,678 in Manhattan to make a standard living.
